# I'll have a double

You prefer to hold four cards in an unbid major for a takeout double, but sometimes you are dealt only three.

West North East South 1♠ ?

If you would pass or overcall, I will agree that you are entitled to your (wrong) opinion. As for myself, I would double and wonder, "What's the problem?"

The flexible takeout double is the standout action.

## Tell me more

When the opponents bid and raise a suit and partner has doubled or overcalled, your double is takeout. This may seem obvious and logical but it — a responsive double — is Alertable.

West North East South

1 ♥ Dbl 2 ♥ ?

• A 6 3 ♥ 7 4 ◆ Q 6 4 2 ♣ K 7 5 3

After partner's takeout double, you want to compete. You certainly won't get rich defending 2 but you have no idea what suit to bid. If you guess a minor, you may hit partner's three-card suit instead of a suit with four or even five cards.

The solution is to ask partner to make the decision. Your responsive double asks him to choose a suit and since you didn't bid spades, he will usually bid a minor.

As long as the opponents bid and raise, responsive doubles are on after partner has overcalled. West North East South
1 ♠ 2 ♣ 2 ♠ ?
♠ 6 3 ♥ A K 5 4 ♠ K 8 7 5 2 ♣ 8 6

Considering that everyone is bidding, you have a pretty good hand. What suit should you bid? Who knows? Once again, the flexible solution is to double.

By the way: How high should responsive doubles be played? When your opponents have voluntarily bid and raised to a high level, you are unlikely to have a trump stack.

Double should still be responsive when the opponents bid game. Obviously, partner will pass your double when he has nothing to bid.

South should double with each of these hands:

### It doesn't take much

If your right-hand opponent bids after partner's takeout double, you don't need a lot to compete.

Everyone knows that you are off the hook after RHO bids. Therefore, many players overreact and pass unless they have solid values.

Once partner promised a reasonable hand with the unbid suits, all you need is something worth saying.

major? A four-card suit is not a problem.

**↑**74 ♥J42 ◆KQ106 ♣9632 Bid 2 ◆. If West becomes

declarer, you want a diamond lead. ♠A ♥KJ964 ♣8643 ♣752

Bid 3 V. You owe partner a jump.

East had only 3 high-card points but his spades were attractive. West, who would probably have led a heart or club, trusted his partner's bid and led the \$\int 2\$. After that lead, South had no chance.
