## Five-Step, Four-Suit Major Suit Raises

One addition to 'Bergen' is the ability, within the framework of the system, to show various four-card trump raises with and without shortness.

The general principle is that the *first-level* jump shift (JS) shows a *limit raise* and shortness somewhere. The *second level* JS shows an *opening hand*, no shortness; i.e. Jacoby. The *third level* shows a *limit raise (no shortness)*, the *fourth level* shows a *constructive raise*, the fifth level shows garbage. A jump to the 4-level is a conventional splinter.

Here is the schedule:

When hearts is the trump suit

- **1**♥ 2♠ Limit raise with singleton somewhere
- **1**♥ 2NT Jacoby (balanced hand)
- 1♥ 3♣ Limit, no singleton
- 1♥ 3♦ Constructive
- 1♥ 3♥ Garbage (Bergen-Like)
- 1♥ 4♣,4♦ Splinter

Opener asks for shortness by bidding "one-up". So, after 1♥-2♠, 2NT asks for shortness.

Responses:

- 3♣ Singleton ♣
- 3♦ Singleton ♦
- 3♥ Singleton ♠

When **spades** is the trump suit

- $1 \bigstar 2NT$  Limit with singleton somewhere
- 1 **▲** 3**♣** Jacoby
- $1 \bigstar 3 \bigstar$  Limit, no singleton
- 1 **▲** 3♥ Constructive
- 1 ♠ 3♠ Garbage (Bergen-Like)
- 1**♠** 4**♣**,4**♦** Splinter

Opener asks for shortness by bidding "one-up". So, after 1♠-2NT, 3♣ asks for shortness. Responses:

3♦ - Singleton ♣

3♥ - Singleton ♦

3♠ - Singleton ♥

Note that after a "Jacoby response", opener either bids shortness, 3 of the major with a good hand, 4 of the major with a normal opening, and 4 of a minor with a good 5-card minor suit.
