
BRIDGE

After North's Flannery opening (two diamonds artificially showed four spades, five hearts and 11-15 high-card points), South went straight to the ninetrick game. On West's top-of-asequence lead, dummy followed low and Linton let East hold the trick with the Queen.


Why? So that East would do what any player in this circumstance would do — he shifted to a low club and South made a great safety play by covering with the 10, as West and North discarded diamonds while contributing raised eyebrows!

South continued with a low club to give East his inescapable winner and, unwilling to break either major, the defender volleyed with another club to allow declarer to sort out 10 tricks on a deal which produced mostly minus scores for North-South.
